

Educator Guide for Dear Mr. G

A picture book by Christine Evans and Gracey Zhang

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Letter Writing Lesson for K-5

The following plan can be adapted for kindergarten to fifth grade according to your needs.

Learning Outcomes

Students will discuss the key ideas and details from the text, discuss the craft and structure of the book, and learn about the different types of letter writing. Then they will write their own letters to tell a story to the recipient.

Lesson Plan

- 1. Explain that writing letters is a way of expressing yourself and connecting with others.
- 2. Talk about some examples of letters: formal, informal, thank you, sorry, invitation, letters to Santa or Tooth Fairy, fan letters.
- 3. Show the cover of *Dear Mr. G* pointing out the illustrator and author names, the title, and other parts of the book. Ask what they think the book might be about.
- 4. Read Dear Mr. G.
- 5. Discuss: the story, characters, settings, and events in the story

- 6. Ask: What were the different types of letters in the story?
- 7. Now you can write your own letters. Discuss as a class ideas of who they could write to. Some ideas: class volunteers, school admin, thank you to a place you visited on a field trip, cards for family members, the President or other government officials, letter to a favorite author, seniors like Mr. G (see resources).
- 8. Write letters talk about the elements of a letter: salutation, introduction, body, sign off (see examples below).
- 9. Talk about what they might include in their letter. They could retell something that happened to them, for example.
- 10. Make and/or decorate envelopes if you would like (see Pinterest board below)
- 11. Show the students how to address an envelope (see resources below).

About Dear Mr. G by Christine Evans (Author), Gracey Zhang (Illustrator)
